

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR



PRAIRIE LAKES LIBRARY SYSTEM **GETS GREEN LIGHT**



Hedberg Public Library has been a member of the Library System Arrowhead Library System (ALS) since it was established in 1974.

In Wisconsin, library systems, like ALS, were created to support public libraries with services and resources that work well in a collaborative environment, such as Interlibrary Loan, automation systems (cataloging, circulation, acquisitions), IT assistance,

marketing, programming, grant projects, and consulting.

Recently the member libraries in ALS merged their automation system with libraries from the Lakeshores Library System (LLS), becoming part of the SHARE automation system. This merger of the automation systems proved very successful and has given patrons access to a larger collection of items, improved delivery, and reduced costs.

With the successful merger of automation systems, it made sense for the libraries in ALS and LLS to explore merging the systems themselves, creating additional efficiencies, leveraging resources, reducing overhead costs, and strengthening collaborative efforts.

A Joint Merger Committee of ALS and LLS members, which serve Racine, Rock, and Walworth counties, reviewed a proposed merger, found it to be a good idea to move forward with the proposal, and took steps to merge the two systems. Committee members representing all three counties voted in favor of the merger, which creates the Prairie Lakes Library System (PLLS), effective January 1, 2023, replacing ALS and LLS.

"This merger process has been years in the making, really, but the last 10 months have been an intense stretch of research, planning, and collaboration," said Steve Platteter, director of Arrowhead Library System.

Steve Ohs, Administrator of Lakeshores Library System added, "It's tremendously rewarding to see the partnerships we've forged become solidified, the research the exploration committee completed used to inform our communities, and the strategic goals of this merger be embraced so enthusiastically not only by every library in both systems but also by all three counties."

As a patron you shouldn't notice any changes to requesting materials or using your library, but behind the scenes, the efficiencies in merging the systems will likely reduce overhead and administration costs, resulting in additional resources to support library services for all patrons.

We are excited about this change moving forward and look forward to bringing you improved services and resources as a member of the Prairie Lakes Library System.

TEACHERS EXPLORE LIBRARY RESOURCES



On September 13, 2022, HPL invited public, private, and homeschool teachers to explore the variety of services and materials offered by the library.

The successful event welcomed 71 attendees, including 60 School District of Janesville teachers who registered and received Continuing Education credits for their participation.

"Though we were particularly hoping to reach the many new teachers this year in the Janesville School District, we were delighted to find many veteran teachers attended as well," says Elizabeth Matson, HPL Head of Youth Services.

In addition to public, private, and homeschool teachers, all grade levels were represented by attendees; and, 48 new Teacher Loan Cards, which allow longer check-out periods to accommodate a unit or semester of study, were issued.

The event was supported by full library participation across all departments as teachers explored a Technology Petting Zoo, learned about databases and electronic services, and were made aware of the

resources in the Wisconsin and Janesville rooms as well as HPL's Bookmobile, Spanish lanugage services, Children's Room, and Teen Central.

A representative from Allies of Native Nations was also on hand to share teacher resources for complying with Wisconsin Act 31.

"Throughout the event, many teachers shared how happy they were that we had the event," Matson says. "We look forward to offering it again next year."



Need a Teacher Loan Card?

Any teacher living in or teaching in Rock County is eligible for a Teacher Loan Card. A teacher who lives in Rock County, but teaches somewhere else – or teaches in Rock County and lives somewhere else – is welcome to apply for a card. Homeschool teachers and childcare providers are also eligible.

To apply for a Teacher Loan Card, you'll need:

- Picture ID and proof of current address.*
- An active email address that is monitored for library alerts.
- Proof of employment at an educational facility (I.D. with name and school, letter from principal/director, etc.), a homeschool state certificate, or a childcare license.

*Out of state residents who work at a Rock County school may be issued a Teacher Loan Card without cost if they first establish a Fee Card at Hedberg Public Library. A Fee Card can be obtained for \$25 per quarter or \$65 per year.

LOCAL NON-PROFIT USES LIBRARY TO HELP TRAIN THERAPY DOGS

Scott Lindner leads the Southern Wisconsin Canine Therapy Dog Association (SWCTDA), a non-profit designed to provide comfort and care through the use of therapy dogs. Scott, a retired sheriff, and his wife, Tina, are dedicated to training therapy dogs to work with kids, veterans, and anyone else who would benefit from interaction with a four-legged friend. Therapy dog handlers believe that their trained and certified dogs can and do make a difference in any situation which they may be called to assist.

SWCTDA trains a variety of dog breeds which have assisted school-aged children with reading disabilities, comforted persons after the loss of a loved one, and provided joy to domestic abuse shelters, support groups, churches, and school functions. Prior to certification as a therapy animal, each dog and handler go through four phases of training: basic obedience, canine good citizen, environmental obedience, and therapy dog. These training sessions are held at multiple locations to expose the dog and handler to the various types of facilities they may visit. The training is concluded with a final exam prior to receiving certification.

Recently, the Lindners made use of Hedberg Public Library's inviting space and welcoming patrons as an exercise for some therapy pups-in-training. Using a public space like the library allows the dogs to become familiar with the many distractions and noises that are present in an environment and build upon the socialization skills and basic commands learned. With their handlers, the four-legged students work on skills like approaching people without jumping, sitting politely during petting, accepting a friendly stranger, and not barking.
