- Watch a science fiction movie that you have never seen. Consider a movie that was made before you were born.
- Look at the constellations and learn about one that you see.
- Read a biography of a space pioneer.
- Read a book about space or a space mission.
- Write a short science fiction story.
- Read a book written by a local author (we have some in almost every genre!). What book did you read?
- Read a 2019 Teens' Top Ten Nominated book that you haven't already read. Find copies of the list in Teen Central or check them out here: <http://www.ala.org/yalsa/teenstopten>.
- Explore Mango or Transparent Language to learn a new language. *(Free for Hedberg Public Library patrons.)*
- Download a movie or audiobook from Hoopla or OverDrive *(Free for ALS library patrons)*.
- Find a readalike for your favorite book. Ask library staff for help if you need it.
- Attend a library program. What program did you attend?
- Visit the HPL bookmobile at one of its stops around town. See the HPL website for a full list of stops. Where was the bookmobile when you visited it?
- Visit the Rainbow Fish Finds His Way Storywalk at Rotary Botanical Gardens.
- Build a rocket or space vehicle out of materials that you have at home.
- Visit a city park that you have never visited before.
- Check out an outdoor community event like the Farmer's Market or Rock Aqua Jays.
- Celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Apollo Moon Landing and observe the moon.

EARLY LITERACY CHALLENGES

- Practice writing letters in the sand at the beach, playground or sandbox.
- Cut some basic shapes out of paper. Let your child play with them. Look for these shapes around the house. Recognizing shapes leads to recognizing letters.
- Look at the night sky with your child and talk about what you see.
- Clap the syllables of the names of the members of your family.
- Pretend you are an astronaut and say the rhyme "Zoom, Zoom, Zoom, We're Going to the Moon".
- Sing "If You're Happy and You Know It" with your child. Sing several verses and ask your child for suggestions for the actions that you will do to show that you are happy.
- Find a book that you can sing to your child, such as a book that illustrates a nursery rhyme, or one that has a repetitive refrain. If you need help finding one, ask at the Children's Desk.
- Sing a lullaby while holding your child and rocking. This is a great way to help your child relax.
- Read a book about the moon or the stars. If you need help finding one, ask at the Children's Desk.
- Attend a storytime or family program.
- Read a book featuring animals. Use different voices as you read.
- Pick a letter or color of the day and find things that feature that letter or color throughout the day.
- Pretend you are an astronaut and blast off into outer space.
- Place a "mystery item" in a bag, describe it to your child and let them guess what it is.
- Use your imagination and a laundry basket and have an adventure. Your basket could be a boat, train car, rocket, trap, or anything else that will spark creativity.



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
